## Background

Established in 1996, the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia is today the largest organisation in Australia dedicated to:

- Helping men deal with the diagnosis and treatment of prostate cancer
- Funding research into prostate cancer
- Raising awareness about prostate cancer in the general community.

At its inception as an initiative of the Rotary Club of Lane Cove, the initial focus of the Foundation was to fund research. However, in 1999, the Foundation amalgamated with the Australian Prostate Cancer Foundation, the governing body of the Association of Prostate Cancer Support Groups, which had members Australia wide.

This amalgamation created, for the first time, an organisation devoted to funding research and providing support for the sufferers of prostate cancer, as well as increasing general awareness about this vital issue.

Since then, PCFA has continued to grow. In 2001, a Victorian Division was established under the leadership of Graeme Johnson, and in 2004, a Western Australian Division was formed under the leadership of Jim Freemantle.

PCFA receives limited Government funding, and relies on the generosity of its supporters to fund our vital and important projects.

## Aims and Objectives

PCFA's objective is to reduce the impact of prostate cancer on the Australian community.

We aim to achieve this via:

- Funding ongoing research into the identification, prevention and treatment of the fundamental causes of prostate cancer
- Providing information, support and counselling to prostate cancer sufferers and their families
- Raising community awareness of the incidence of prostate cancer.

## Accountability

PCFA operates under the charitable fundraising legislation as prescribed by each individual State and territory in Australia and associated regulations, including the Australian Securities and Investments Commission.

PCFA has been granted endorsement as a tax deductible gift recipient under Subdivision 30-BA of the Income Tax Act 1997 by the Australian Commissioner of Taxation.

# Chairman's Report

As I approach the end of my first year as National Chairman, it is with much pleasure that I report on the activities of PCFA for the year ended 30 June 2007.

The past year has been one of great growth and excitement for PCFA which could not have occurred without the foundation established by previous Chairmen under whom I have served. While I do not want to dwell unnecessarily on the past, I do want to record the significant contribution made to PCFA by Jim O'Ryan, the late Max Gardner AM and Patricia Watson. Their contribution to PCFA has been enormous and I am delighted that both Jim and Patricia see fit to continue to serve on the National Board.

During the financial year, PCFA recognised the outstanding contributions of three people by awarding them Life Membership of PCFA. They are:

- Roger Climpson OAM, who with his fellow members at the Lane Cove Rotary Club, founded the predecessor to PCFA;
- Bruce Fisher, a long standing Director of PCFA;
- Professor Pamela Russell AM, Director of Oncology Research Centre, Prince of Wales Hospital Sydney and Conjoint Professor, Department of Medicine, University of New South Wales and a former Director of the Prostate Cancer Research Foundation of Australia, one of the predecessors of PCFA.

PCFA is fortunate to have an energetic Board. During the year, Professor Rob Baxter, former Chairman of the Research Committee, and Chris Photakis, Finance Director, retired as Directors. I thank them for their contribution to PCFA. We welcomed Chris Hall, a partner of KPMG, as the new Finance Director, Professor John Mills as Chairman of the revamped Research Committee, Anita Ziemer, a Victorian Board member, and Peter Falk OAM, as new Directors (Peter has since resigned). I thank those new Directors for seeing fit to join PCFA and also my other fellow Directors for their ongoing support and contribution.

In particular, I want to thank David Sandoe OAM for the wonderful support he has given me in his role as Deputy Chairman and Steve Callister, David Curtain QC and Jim Freemantle, Chairmen of the NSW, Victorian and WA State Boards respectively.

PCFA is also fortunate to have a very dedicated and talented staff led by Andrew Giles, our Chief Executive Officer, who works tirelessly for PCFA. The Board identified that to sustain the remarkable growth PCFA has seen over the past two years, it is necessary for additional support staff to assist Andrew and his team. At the time of writing, the process of recruitment of additional staff is well under way.

In her report last year, Patricia Watson reported an increase of 84 per cent in total income for the financial year ending 30 June 2005. I am happy to report that the growth of income has continued at a healthy rate and that the budget set by the Board was exceeded by a substantial margin.

PCFA's ability to fund leading-edge research and to continue to do so over the next few years has been underwritten by our major sponsor, Movember. From small seeds, large trees grow and such is the case with the success of Movember. In May 2007, we were delighted to receive a cheque from Movember for in excess of \$2.5 million. PCFA values its association and partnership with Movember and is indebted to Movember for choosing PCFA as the beneficiary of its largesse. We are also delighted that Movember's other charity is *beyondblue, the national depression initiative*, with which PCFA has so much in common in the important area of men's health. Finally, I am delighted to announce that PCFA has signed a three-year agreement with Movember which will incorporate the Movember campaigns of 2007, 2008 and 2009.

Don Argus, AO, has been an unstinting worker for the PCFA cause and I thank him and his Corporate Fundraising Committee for opening many doors for us and raising substantial funds.

Australian Pensioners Insurance Agency (APIA) has been a longstanding supporter of PCFA and through the APIA-funded *Be A Man – Talk to your Doctor about Prostate Cancer* campaign, PCFA has been able to raise awareness of prostate cancer. Despite the winding down of that campaign, the impact of the Be A Man campaign is still evident and working so positively for us.

ANOP survey results for 2006 indicated a marked improvement in knowledge and awareness of prostate cancer. Since 2002, there has been a 20 per cent increase in understanding in the 50-59 age group. In 2002, 50 per cent of people had little knowledge, whereas in 2006 that figure had fallen to 35 per cent.

Education is another important part of PCFA's work. PCFA continued to provide material about prostate cancer to GPs, assisted with the revised edition of the *Treating ED (Erectile Dysfunction)* brochure and is involved in a joint initiative with the Continence Foundation of Australia and the Urological Society of Australia and New Zealand to develop a publication on the issue of incontinence for men following treatment for prostate cancer. PCFA also assisted with publication of the *What Women Need to*

*Know about Prostate Cancer* booklet, of which we have received a lot of very positive feedback. Thanks are due to the Public Awareness and Education Committee chaired by Professor Dexter Dunphy, AM.

PCFA could not fulfil its important role without the support of wonderful sponsors and benefactors, who are detailed elsewhere in this Report. An innovative event designed to increase awareness of prostate cancer took place at the MCG prior to the Queen's Birthday Melbourne v Collingwood clash. Two hundred volunteers paraded three pairs of enormous undies kindly manufactured by Pacific Brands. Those undies have travelled extensively throughout the country assisting PCFA to raise awareness of prostate cancer.

In February 2007, PCFA agreed to partner with Cancer Australia, in a new Federal Government initiative in which Cancer Australia matches grants for prostate cancer research in line with priorities identified by PCFA.

One of the great strengths of PCFA is its extensive Support Group network. We now have over 70 Support Groups throughout the country who work tirelessly to assist men diagnosed with prostate cancer and their families. Research indicates that men value the camaraderie, information, emotional support and reduced feelings of isolation that they receive from their involvement with Support Groups. During the year, Bill McHugh took over from the Joint Chairs Don Baumber and David Sandoe as the Chairman of the Support Advocacy (SAC) Committee. I thank Don and David for their contributions and Bill and his SAC committee for their continued efforts in creating awareness, lobbying governments and politicians, and encouraging and guiding the work and development of the Support Group network.

I said at the outset that I did not want to dwell on the past. I am very much looking forward to the future. I think that a great foundation has been laid from which PCFA may continue to grow. I do not underestimate the enormous task ahead, but believe that the Board has set in place policies and a structure which will enable PCFA to work towards achieving its very important mission and going from strength to strength. Again, I thank the Directors, the State Boards, Committees and our staff led by Andrew Giles, for their commitment and ongoing efforts.

# CEO's Report

One word more than any other sums up the impact of Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA) in 2006/2007 – Movember.

It is hard to overestimate the impact that this single event has had on both the awareness of, and funding for, prostate cancer. Looking back on my first meeting with Movember in August 2004 I am impressed how far we have come. Back then Movember had to meet me in the coffee shop next to the old PCFA office which wasn't big enough to hold a meeting. While much has been made of the fact that PCFA agreed to support Movember based on little more than a hunch and a planned budget – we also need to acknowledge that Movember agreed to work with the small but passionate PCFA. At that stage we were committed, but with limited reach. Three years on, we are still relatively small, increasingly passionate – but now with both national and international impact.

Movember 2006 saw more than 45,000 men across Australia grow moustaches with just over \$5,000,000 being raised in Australia to be split between PCFA and our partner organisation beyondblue: the national depression initiative.

At the same time, PCFA has been fortunate to continue to receive increasing support from the Australian community and business. These escalating levels of support have enabled PCFA to more effectively fulfil its mission: to reduce the impact of prostate cancer on the Australian community in the key areas of research, awareness and support.

The highlight of our research work was the establishment – under the Chairmanship of Professor John Mills – of a new National Research Committee. The new Committee will use the outcomes of the 2005 BHP National Audit of Prostate Cancer Research to focus the direction of PCFA funding budgets.

The current PCFA Research Fellowship holder, Dr Annika Antonsson, continues her excellent work in the area of the human papilloma virus in prostate cancer at Professor Ian Frazer's Diamantina Institute for Cancer, Immunology and Metabolic Medicine. Professor Frazer, AM, was 2006 Australian of the Year and is renowned for his cervical cancer vaccine, Gardasil.

PCFA continues to fund scholarships to enable nurses to enrol in the La Trobe University Prostate Care Distance Programs. Thanks to generous support from Allens Arthur Robinson this scheme was further extended in 2006/07.

Research continues to be an expensive process and we have been very fortunate to have Mr Don Argus AO and his working party of Mr Monty Chapman, Mr David Morgan, Mr Jim Freemantle, Mr David Meickljohn and Mr

David Crawford working so effectively to raise funds for our Collaborative Research Initiative.

In the area of support, PCFA, in partnership with the Commonwealth Bank of Australia (CBA), undertook a series of rural and regional information evenings. After initially focusing on NSW and Victoria in 2005/2006, this year PCFA has moved to key areas of South Australia and Western Australia. The value of these information evenings cannot be overestimated. I had the pleasure of coordinating and then hosting the functions in South Australia (Victor Harbor, Murray Bridge and Port Pirie) and I was overwhelmed by the level of support we received in these areas. The urgent need to educate men and women in the rural and regional communities has never been so clearly evident and we could not even consider such events without the support of the CBA.

The number of support groups has also continued to rise and the value of this unique and extensive network is vitally important. In the early days following diagnosis – as well as throughout treatment and recovery – many men and their partners gain valuable encouragement and strength from these regular support groups. With over 70 groups spread across Australia, there is at least one prostate cancer support meeting every week.

Our ongoing community analysis via Australian National Opinion Polls (ANOP) clearly shows that awareness of prostate cancer is on the rise. This is due to such great initiatives as:

- our long-standing partnership with Australian Pensioners Insurance Agency (APIA) and its *Be a Man: talk to your doctor about prostate cancer* campaign;
- our new television campaign featuring Australian music legend Angry Anderson – which was launched in International Men's Health Week 2007 – highlighting the tragic loss of fellow Rose Tattoo band member, Pete Wells;
- and of course the enormous impact of Movember. This year the awareness and income exceeded all expectations reaching \$2,500,000. The four men behind the event – Adam Garone, Luke Slattery, Travis Garone and Justin Coghlan – should be applauded for developing such a novel, effective and successful fundraising event – one that continues to make a profound difference on the level of research funding available in Australia.

2006/07 was another successful year for the PCFA as we aimed to achieve our mission statement to reduce the impact of prostate cancer on the Australian community. Thank you to the ongoing commitment from our major partners Novartis, AstraZeneca, Commonwealth Bank of Australia, Mazda Foundation, Sanofi Aventis, the Baxter Charitable Foundation and Shell, as well as the Australian Pensioners Insurance Agency.

However it is our database of loyal supporters that continues to keep PCFA afloat and we are grateful for each and every donation we receive – regardless of size. We are particularly touched by the growing number of donations we receive in lieu of flowers or gifts at memorial services, anniversaries and birthdays.



The result will be greater access to treatment and services and even greater access to funding for research and awareness.

Thank you all for your ongoing support and I look forward to working with you to achieve this goal throughout 2007 and 2008.

# Research

## Collaborative Research Initiative / Mazda Fellowship

In early 2007, PCFA joined with the Australian Government's new cancer agency, Cancer Australia, the National Breast Cancer Foundation and Diagnostics + technology in the Collaborative Research Initiative, a new scheme designed to improve coordination and maximise the value of cancer charities' support for research. The new Priority-driven Collaborative Cancer Research Scheme will provide up to \$10 million for priority research grants in 2008 and 2009.

The Scheme funds projects that focus on answering important research questions; encourage researchers to work collaboratively; increase consumer involvement in research, draw new researchers to cancer research; and have an impact on populations with poorer outcomes within the community, such as people in rural and regional areas or Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Each partner in the Scheme will fund research projects that aim to answer the questions they have identified as most likely to make a difference to cancer outcomes in Australia. Importantly, every research dollar provided by the partners goes directly to research, as Cancer Australia funds the administrative and assessment processes and the National Health and Medical Research Council manages the registration and assessment of applications.

### The PCFA's priority areas for research are:

- Identification of new markers for the presence of prostate cancer or markers which can determine cancer biology;
- New therapeutics for locally invasive or metastatic prostate cancer and proposals which directly address the needs of patients with prostate cancer;
- New imaging technologies in trials of prostate cancer detection and progression, as well as evaluating novel therapeutic treatment response in clinical trials;
- Other areas of research will also be considered.

### Mazda PCFA Biomedical Postdoctoral Research Fellowship

In 2006, the first Mazda PCFA Biomedical Postdoctoral Research Fellowship was awarded to Dr Annika Antonsson (Diamantina Institute for Cancer, Immunology and Metabolic Medicine, University of Queensland) for her work in investigating the role of the human papillomavirus (HPV) in the development of prostate cancer.

*"The papillomaviruses are a family of small DNA viruses belonging to the Papillomaviridae-family. So far, more than 100 different human papillomavirus (HPV) types have been fully characterised and in addition, several papillomavirus types have been isolated*

*from a number of animal species. HPV types that are found preferentially in cervical and other genital cancers have been designated high-risk types. These high risk HPVs have been identified as the causative agent in 99 per cent or more of cervical cancers and have also been detected in more than 50 per cent of other anogenital cancers.*

*The most prevalent high-risk HPV types are HPV-16 and HPV-18, which account for 70 per cent of the cancer cases, with another ten types making up the other 30 per cent. These HPV types have therefore emerged as one of the most important identified risk factors for widespread human cancer and types 16 and 18 are included in the new cervical cancer vaccine, Gardasil, which was developed at the Diamantina Institute and approved for use last year. Circumstantial evidence suggests HPV could also be associated with prostate cancer, including similarities in the predictive factors and clinical course compared with cervical cancer.*

*We have collected prostate tissue samples from 44 prostates – 26 from prostate cancers and 18 from benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH). Blood samples were collected from 37 prostate patients (28 patients with adenocarcinoma and 9 with BPH). All samples were analysed for the presence of HPV DNA.*

*We detected HPV DNA in about 20 per cent of the prostate cancer tissue samples and in about 40 per cent of the BPH samples. In the blood samples we found more HPV in the prostate cancer patients (40 per cent) than in BPH patients (10 per cent). The only HPV type detected in the samples to date is HPV 18.*

*Our conclusion so far is that HPV DNA can readily be found in prostate tissue biopsies and in peripheral blood samples from prostate patients and BPH patients. Identification of a virus that is a risk factor in the development of prostate cancer makes it possible to screen for the virus and prevent it by vaccination."*

# Nursing Scholarships

PCFA continues to support the National Prostate Nursing Care Scholarship which are awarded to Registered Nurses around the country. In partnership with the La Trobe University Faculty of Health Sciences, School of Nursing, the Nursing Scholarships program is conducted via professionally supported distance education. The Scholarships are awarded on successful completion of the course. For the first time in 2007, the course included the prescribed text *Contemporary issues in prostate cancer: A nursing perspective* (Held-Warmkessel, J [Ed] 2006). Thank you to Allens Arthur Robinson whose continued generous support of the 2007 PCFA National Prostate Nursing Care Scholarships enable the expansion of this vital scheme.

## New marker for metastatic prostate cancer

PCFA's inaugural Postdoctoral Research Fellow in 2002, Associate Professor Susan Henshall reported last year on the development of a new prostate cancer marker for identifying aggressive prostate cancers. Approximately one in five prostate cancer sufferers go on to develop life threatening, metastatic prostate cancer within 10 years of surgery.

To date, the best predictor of prostate cancer specific survival is the prostate-specific antigen doubling time (PSADT), a measure of the rate of increase in blood prostate specific antigen (PSA) levels following surgery. Recent research however shows that men who have low levels of a marker called AZGP1 in the prostate at the time of surgery have a greatly increased risk of developing metastatic cancer. This means that these men could benefit from more aggressive treatment such as radiotherapy or chemotherapy around the time of surgery, when they still have potentially curable cancer, and men with a low risk of developing metastatic disease would have the option of deferring treatments that have a negative impact on quality of life.

"Our research supports a strong link between absent or weak AZGP1 expression in the prostate at the time of surgery and metastatic prostate cancer. Our future research will focus on a simple automated test for detecting AZGP1 levels in prostate tissue taken at the time of surgery, but also in pre-surgery biopsies that could eventually be used to improve the prediction of metastatic spread of prostate cancer. The prognostic value that AZGP1 expression adds to that provided by PSA alone, is that AZGP1 levels can be measured in the radical prostatectomy specimen significantly sooner than a rising PSA can be detected, thereby providing timely information to guide adjuvant intervention. Ultimately, this will allow doctors and patients to make informed decisions at the time of surgery," "The next step is to confirm the reliability of AZGP1 as a marker of poor outcome in large groups of men with prostate cancer and a trial of the AZGP1 test has commenced recently in some Sydney hospitals," stated Susan Henshall.



Corporate Australia continues to support the PCFA research plan. At a corporate thank-you function in Sydney, Corporate Fundraising Committee Chair, Don Argus AO, was joined by the Hon Jim Lloyd, Minister for Roads, Territories and Local Government, Wayne Swan, Federal Shadow Treasurer and PCFA CEO, Andrew Giles.

## Support & Advocacy

The national Support and Advocacy Committee (SAC) consists of representatives of the network of PCFA affiliated support groups across Australia.

These support groups provide direct support for men and their families whose lives have been affected by prostate cancer. Through group interaction and with the support of health professionals, the groups provide educational information and allow members to express their fears and hopes, while showing that life after diagnosis of prostate cancer can be fulfilling. Group activities are complemented with one-on-one interaction that is highly personal and confidential. Having travelled the journey, support group members understand the emotions that are being experienced and the maze of information that newly-diagnosed men have to work through when considering available treatment options and possible side effects.

The SAC's responsibilities include tending to the composite needs of support group members and presenting non-medical consumer views and requirements for the delivery of positive outcomes to the Board. Support group members are the grass roots of the PCFA, giving the Foundation a distinct and credible voice with which to discuss real-world issues with the public, Government and medical bodies.

### Highlights of SAC achievements in 2006/07 include:

- Board approval for a policy statement on the use of Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) testing and Digital Rectal Examination (DRE) for the early detection of prostate cancer;
- Establishing an annual program of projects to be project-managed by SAC;
- Embarking on support group involvement in activism, with the first case advocating the inclusion of Taxotere on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) list for advanced prostate cancer treatment;
- The inclusion of psychosocial studies and support for involvement in clinical trials in research categories eligible for PCFA grant funding;
- Establishing a DVD library of quality presentations by leading specialists, as a resource for provincial support group convenors;
- Planning for the ongoing viability of support groups through succession planning based on adult-learning processes, upgrading of Leaders and Speakers

manuals, the provision of brochure material and exposure to international best practices.

**Unresolved challenges being addressed by the SAC include:**

- Strengthening and growing the State-based Chapter organisational unit.
- Reaching out to men in rural and remote locations through our web presence and the adoption of other technologies.
- Enhancing our relationships with health professionals so that they value the involvement of support groups as an integral part of patient treatment and recovery.
- Establishing a support group mechanism focusing on the needs of men with advanced prostate cancer.
- Establishing a filtered information resource on clinical trials that communicates with patients in a manner that is accessible and readily understood.

We acknowledge with much appreciation the valued support that we have received from the Board and PCFA's management team in pursuit of our goals and objectives.

# Awareness

After another busy year for PCFA, there is increasing evidence of raised awareness of prostate cancer as a serious men's health issue. Apart from the distribution of quarterly distribution of *Prostate News* to almost 30,000 households, PCFA initiated a range of awareness raising activities, as well as participating in the regular, longer standing events.

PCFA also distributed four publications, *What Women (and Their Men) need to know about prostate cancer*, *Conquering Incontinence*, *Your guide to Prostate Cancer the disease, treatment options and outcomes – 2nd Edition* and *Localised Prostate Cancer – A guide for Men and their Families* via the website, as well as a DVD of the inaugural *PCFA Men's Health Promotion Conference*. Calls to PCFA freecall information line continued to rise monthly – as have hits to our website.

## PCFA National Ambassadors

The pilot of the new national PCFA Ambassadors Speaking Program, sponsored by Australian Pensioners Insurance Agency (APIA) started in September 2006. The program aims to provide trained, high quality speakers on prostate health in metropolitan, regional, rural and remote Australia. With a mission to instigate education, awareness and action, PCFA invites men to speak with younger members of their families about prostate health issues, as family history is factor in the onset of prostate cancer. PCFA Ambassadors also accept invitations from community groups and corporations.

## Prostate Cancer Awareness Month: September 2006



Inaugural Father's Day 5 fun run

In September, PCFA marked Prostate Cancer Awareness Month with activities around Australia. First was the inaugural Father's Day 5 event held at Sydney Olympic Park on 3 September 2006 which, aside from being a

fun day for the whole family, was a great success with a highlight being the passionate speech by Australian rock icon Normie Rowe on the need for greater awareness of prostate cancer and its issues. The five kilometre fun run attracted more than 1,000 participants and was organised by event managers Sporting Spectrum (with assistance from PCFA volunteers), event partner Sydney Olympic Park Authority and ten event sponsors. Minister for Health and Ageing, the Hon Tony Abbott MP, started the runners before joining them himself. The Hon Jim Lloyd MP, Minister for Local Government, Territories and Roads also took part. Other entertainment included stilt walkers, African drummers, comical characters and circus performers.

In Canberra, Prostate Cancer Awareness Month was launched at Parliament House on 11 September 2006 and attended by PCFA's political friends and Support Group members. Cricketer Doug Walters addressed the gathering, sharing cricket anecdotes with the appreciative crowd. The Hon Jim Lloyd MP, and Wayne Swan MP, Shadow Treasurer also shared their personal experiences of prostate cancer. Kevin Pattison of Australian Pensioners Insurance (APIA) elaborated on the impact and success of the APIA-sponsored *Be A Man* campaign.

On 23 September 2006, the Governor's Cup, a four ball elimination Ambrose, was held at the Macquarie Links Golf Club in Sydney, attracting 124 players and 13 hole sponsors. A lunch presentation and charity auction followed the event which raised \$16,000 in total. On 26 May 2007, the PCFA was also principal beneficiary of a major golf day attended by 174 people at the National Golf Course on Victoria's Mornington Peninsula by the team from Heritage Finance. Rupert Legh and his team at Heritage, including Samantha Dalla Rosa – are to be congratulated on such a great community initiative.

## International Men's Health Week: 11–17 June 2007

Since 2003, International Men's Health Week (IMHW) has been a major awareness raising event for promoting men's health across Australia. PCFA events included the launch of the partnership with the Melbourne Football Club at the Chairman's luncheon during the Melbourne v Collingwood match at the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) on the Queen's Birthday Holiday Monday, 11 June 2007. On 'Undie Mundie', three giant pairs of the world's biggest underpants (specially manufactured by PCFA's partner, Bonds and measuring 15 x 7.5 metres), were unveiled before the match to focus attention on the risk of prostate cancer for Australian men. Melbourne Football Club Chairman, Paul Gardner, dedicated the Queen's Birthday

match to prostate cancer, commenting that many high profile former players were prostate cancer survivors.

### Men's health promotion forums

The inaugural PCFA Men's Health Promotion Conference, sponsored by Australian Pensioners Insurance Agency (APIA), was held on 12 August 2006 at Melbourne's Victoria University. More than 200 delegates from across Australia heard from a range of leading international and Australian speakers including Professor Tony Costello, Director of Urology, Royal Melbourne Hospital and University of Melbourne and Professor Fred Saad, Director of Urologic Oncology, Professor of Surgery Notre Dame Hospital, Montreal, Canada.

The very positive response to the inaugural Men's Health Promotion Forum in 2006 was followed up by another in Perth on 16 June 2007 as part of International Men's Health Week. Sponsored again by APIA, Forum partners also included the Continence Foundation of Australia, American Medical Systems, Eli Lilly, Pfizer, Astra-Zeneca, Mayne Pharma Urology, the Rotary Club of Perth and Independence Solutions, this Forum also attracted almost 200 delegates. AFL footballer John Todd did a great deal to promote the Forum, as well as giving the opening address. During the lunch break, a pair of the giant Bonds underpants was unveiled to highlight the fact that one man dies of prostate cancer every three hours in Australia.

In Sydney, PCFA supported the two-day Best Practice Workshop on 15 and 16 June 2007 organised by the

NSW Urology Oncology Program, the Urological Society of Australia and New Zealand and The Faculty of Radiation Oncology Genito-urinary Group which covered the current status in evidence-based medicine as it applies to prostate, bladder, renal and testicular cancers. It followed similar highly successful workshops in 2001 and 2004 where the multiple disciplines involved in the management of genito-urinary cancers came together in this educational forum.

IMHW also saw the launch of a series of three hard-hitting national community service announcements featuring Angry Anderson, encouraging Australian men to talk to their doctor about prostate health. The 30-second advertisements were inspired by Rose Tattoo guitarist Pete Wells, who before losing his battle with prostate cancer in 2006, asked his friend and band-mate, Angry Anderson, to help spread the message about prostate cancer. The new advertisements were made possible by Blundstone Australia, PCFA, and the Australian General Practice Network.

### Throughout the year

In February 2007, PCFA supported a new publication by Dr Irena Madjar, former Professor of Nursing, University of Newcastle entitled *What Women (And Their Men) Need To Know About Prostate Cancer* which followed on from earlier research that identified that women needed to be better informed about what might happen if their husband, father or partner is affected by prostate cancer.

In May 2007, PCFA was the Sanctuary Cove International Boat Show community partner. The largest on-water boat show in the Asia-Pacific, the Sanctuary Cove International Boat Show was also a terrific opportunity to spread the word about prostate cancer and Support Group members were on hand to man the PCFA information booth.

Also in May, in Melbourne, PCFA partnered with community organisations Can-Survive, Carers Victoria, National Ovarian Cancer Network, the Continence Foundation of Australia and Brainlink to host the Support Forum for People Who Care, a community outreach initiative recognising the growing needs of those caring for a family member or loved one with a chronic illness or disability. The Forum was attended by some 120 people and aimed to provide practical information, skills and resources for carers. It is planned to replicate this successful event nationally.

# Awareness – Movember

Movember certainly is changing the face of men's health. In 2004, Movember became an official male health initiative and grew to 262 Mo Bros, raising just over \$55,000 for PCFA. In 2005, 9,315 registered Mo Bros raised more than \$1.2 million for prostate cancer research and in 2006, Movember went international, running in London, Singapore, New Zealand and Australia, with the net proceeds donated equally between PCFA and *beyondblue*, the national depression initiative. By the end of Movember 2006, 44,756 Mo Bros and Mo Sistas raised \$6.63 million. *beyondblue* will use its funds to increase the community's awareness of depression in men and to reduce the stigma associated with men living with depression, while the more than \$2.5 million of PCFA funds will be used to support the Collaborative Research Initiative.

The aim of Movember is to challenge the "she'll be right" attitude prevalent among Australian men, which goes hand in hand with a reluctance to see a doctor about an illness, or for regular medical checks. At the start of Movember (the month formally known as November), men register with a clean shaven face. From then, the "Mo Bros", have until the end of the month to grow and groom their moustache and along the way raise as much money and awareness about male health issues as possible. Movember culminates at the gala parties at the end of the month where Tom Selleck and David Boon look-alikes battle it out on the catwalk for their chance to take home the prestigious Man of Movember title.

## The key male health causes for Movember 2006 were:

- Prostate cancer, in partnership with PCFA, because every year in Australia 2,700 men die of prostate cancer – more than the number of women who die from breast cancer.
- Male depression, in partnership with *beyondblue*, because one in six men suffer from depression at any given time, but most don't seek help.
- Testicular cancer, because it's the second most common cancer in young men aged 18 to 35.

In terms of raising awareness, the event was extremely successful with more than 650 newspaper articles and daily mentions on television and radio. The Movember website is an invaluable communication mechanism with more than 1.3 million visits during the campaign period. The gala parties held in each capital city were attended by more than 12,000 people. 2006 also saw the introduction of the 'Mo Town parties' in which people in regional areas could register to hold their own end

of Movember function. There were 19 Mo Town parties from Bendigo and Wagga Wagga to Port Headland. Earlier in the year the Movember team also attended the Deniliquin Ute Muster, which attracts over 20,000 people annually, and which reinforced for the Movember team the importance of focusing on male health in regional Australia. Movember 2006 was made possible with the generous support of major sponsors Motorola, Polaroid, Remington and VB, along with many supporting sponsors who provided product, funds and time to ensure the campaign's success.



# Awareness – Commonwealth Bank

In Australia the ratio of prostate cancer deaths in men living in rural to metropolitan areas is 121:100. This is due partly to lack of awareness, late presentation to doctors and other barriers to health in rural areas.

Commonwealth Bank/PCFA Rural Prostate Health Information Evenings aimed to reduce the disparity between prostate cancer mortality in rural and metropolitan areas through increased public awareness of disease characteristics, diagnosis and treatment options.

The Commonwealth Bank has a strong commitment to rural communities across Australia and as part of the Commonwealth Bank Rural Health Men's Initiative, in 2005 the Commonwealth Bank funded PCFA to hold free Prostate Health Information Evenings for the general public and health professionals (male and female) in regional centres, with specialist prostate cancer information provided by an urologist. The Commonwealth Bank staff then toured around Australia in a large yellow bus, with the *Today Show* and *Women's Weekly*, and promoted these health information evenings which occurred in the towns and cities approximately three weeks after the bus visited.

These Information Evenings worked to provide a community forum to listen and discuss prostate health with qualified health professionals, promote discussions of prostate health with general practitioner, determine the need to establish a Support Group in each town visited and strengthen existing groups, and endorse the Commonwealth Bank's involvement in rural communities. The free Information Evenings run for two hours in the early evening, followed by a light supper with tea and coffee.

"We hoped to assist the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia raise awareness and educate all Australians about prostate cancer and its effects. It is time for all of us – as spouses, children, parents and friends – to

encourage men to be conscious and proactive when it comes to prostate cancer detection and education," said Barbara Chapman, Commonwealth Bank Group Executive – Human Resources and Group Services.

These free evenings were very well attended. Surveyed attendees said that they were interested in learning about prostate health issues from the medical experts. Question time was extremely popular and the urologists experience was valued highly by the audiences, as were the experiences of the prostate cancer survivors. Many men in the audience related to these personal experiences and shared information during question time and at the end of the evening.

In 2007, the first seminar held in Canberra on 28 March was standing room only as hundreds of men and women of all ages came to hear local experts and people who have been affected by prostate cancer, including Federal Shadow Treasurer, Wayne Swan. Other speakers included PCFA CEO Andrew Giles; urologist, Associate Professor Phillip Stricker; Jim Clough from the ACT Prostate Cancer Support Group; prostate cancer survivor, Bruce Evans; Sheila Duke, the wife of a prostate cancer survivor; and Monica Mago, Commonwealth Bank, Canberra Manager, Lending and Insurance.

In June 2007, the campaign shifted to South Australia with seminars in Victor Harbor, Murray Bridge and Port Pirie and has since gone to Western Australia and Queensland.

Prior to being appointed CEO of the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia on 1 July 2004, Mr Giles had worked for a range of national and international not-for-profit organisations including the University of Sydney, University of NSW, AUSTCARE, Sydney Children's Hospital and the Yothu Yindi Foundation.

As CEO and Company Secretary of the Foundation, Mr Giles has overseen the rapid growth of the Foundation into the peak body in the fight against prostate cancer in Australia. In his role, he has overseen such initiatives as the launch of the 2005 Be A Man: Talk to Your Doctor About Prostate Cancer national campaign, the Foundation's involvement with Movember and the development of both International Men's Health Week and International Prostate Cancer Awareness Week.

As well as playing a leadership role with the Fundraising Institute of Australia (FIA) Mr Giles is also a judge for the Australian Luminous Awards – promoting excellence in cancer journalism.

## Principal Activities

The principal activity of the Foundation during the financial year 2006/07 was to raise awareness and attract widespread financial support for the work of the Foundation to:

- a fund research into the causes, detection, diagnosis and improved treatment of prostate cancer ;
- b provide information, support and counseling to those affected by prostate cancer; and
- c raise community awareness of the incidence of prostate cancer, thereby encouraging earlier detection and more effective treatment of the disease.

No significant changes in the nature of the Foundation's activity occurred during the financial year.

## Operating Result

The operating surplus of the Foundation for the year ended 30 June 2007 amounted to \$3,322,135. (2006: \$1,544,816).

## Dividends

The Foundation is limited by guarantee and is not permitted to pay dividends.

## Review of Operations

The Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia Limited has had another highly successful year. This was due in many ways to the ongoing commitment of the Foundation's database of loyal supporters that continues to support the Foundation's Mission of reducing the impact of prostate cancer on the Australian community.

At the same time the support of major events, such as Movember, as well as corporate partners has enabled the Foundation to deal with the increasing demand for its services.

The highlight of PCFA's research work was the establishment, under the Chairmanship of Professor John Mills, of a new National Research Committee. The new

Committee will, using the outcomes of the 2005 BHP National Audit of Prostate Cancer Research, focus the direction of PCFA's funding budgets.

The number of support groups has also continued to rise and the value of this unique and extensive network is vitally important. In the early days following diagnosis, as well as throughout treatment and recovery, many men and their partners gain valuable encouragement and strength from these regular support groups.

PCFA's ongoing community analysis via Australian National Opinion Polls (ANOP) clearly shows that awareness of prostate cancer is on the rise.

2006/07 has been another year of great growth for the Foundation. PCFA believes this will continue over the years ahead thanks to its generous and broad base of financial supporters.

### **Significant Changes in State of Affairs**

No significant changes in PCFA's state of affairs occurred during the financial year.

### **After Balance Date Events**

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of PCFA, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Foundation in future financial years.

# Discussion and Analysis of the Financial Statements

## Information on Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia Limited Concise Financial Report

The concise financial report is an extract from the full financial report for the year ended 30 June 2007. The financial statements and disclosures in the concise financial report have been derived from the 2007 Financial Report of Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia Limited (PCFA). A copy of the full financial report and auditor's report will be provided to any member, free of charge, upon request.

The discussion and analysis is provided to assist members in understanding the concise financial report. The discussions and analysis is based on PCFA's financial statements and the information contained in the concise financial report has been derived from the full 2007 Financial Report of PCFA.

### Income Statement

PCFA has reported a surplus of \$3,322,135 for the year ended 30 June 2007, representing an increase of \$1,777,319 from the prior year. This is mainly as a result of the strong success and significant growth in the Movember initiative with revenue received directly from Movember increasing by 134 per cent on 2006. Additional revenue was also derived from donations for research, major gifts, mail donations, investment income and the growth in the value of PCFA's investment portfolio. While revenue increased the Foundation experienced a substantial increase in expenses, consistent with the increase in the operations and actions of PCFA. Notwithstanding the cost increases PCFA's cost of fundraising as a percentage of receipts decreased during the year.

### Balance Sheet

Total assets increased by \$3,389,505 to \$6,320,904 representing an increase of 116 per cent. This increase is mainly reflected in cash and cash equivalents held by the entity as a result of the substantial increase in revenue received from the Movember initiative. The Foundation's net asset position has increased from \$2,835,276 as at 30 June 2006 to \$6,157,411 as at 30 June 2007 as a result of the operating surplus generated during the year. Subsequent to year end the board will review additional funds generated during the year to determine the best

use with regards to funding research into prostate cancer, providing support, information and counselling to those affected by the illness and raising community awareness of the incidence of prostate cancer.

### Cash Flow Statement

PCFA generated significant cash flows from operations during 2007. PCFA experienced an increase in operating cash flows through increased receipts in donations and funds received through the Movember initiative. Payments to suppliers and employees also increased during 2007 by 68 per cent on 2006.
